

Adventure to Phnom Penh



Approximately 12½ Hours



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A scenic 4 1/2-hour drive brings you to Phnom Penh. Along the way you will pass through numerous rice and sugar palm plantations—typical features of rural Cambodia. The lush green, almost deserted landscape incorporates the beautiful forest-clad Elephant Mountain range as the highway makes its way inland. **Phnom Penh**, a vibrant and bustling capital, where cyclos still share the streets with motorbikes and cars, is thriving as one of Asia’s most exotic cities. It is conveniently located on the banks where three rivers converge—the Mekong, the Tonle Sap and the Bassac. With a culture of sidewalk cafés, the colonial French influence can still be felt today. It includes a legacy of lovely colonial-era residences built for French administrators. However, Phnom Penh’s era of modern development and planning took place after Independence in 1953, with the addition of tree-lined avenues, gardens with fountains and several distinctive monuments reflecting the city’s new-found freedom. Upon arrival in Phnom Penh, you will head directly to a local hotel for **lunch**. After lunch, visit the restored **National Museum**, representing the finest of Phnom Penh’s architecture. On display inside is a selection of more than 5,000 works of art, ranging from the 6th to the 13th century. Treasures include sculptures, 19th-century dance costumes, royal barges and palanquins. Visitors can rest by the peaceful, palm-shaded central courtyard and lotus ponds and contemplate the civilization of one of Asia’s richest cultures. Continue to the **Royal Palace**. Built in 1866 by King Norodom, it is now home to King Sihamoni. Some of the buildings inside the palace walls are closed to the public except on special occasions. Within the palace compound are the coronation hall; the entrance, which houses an open-air theatre for the Royal Dance Troupe, and a balcony for royal appearances; an open-air pavilion often used for entertaining and viewing of the King’s movies; and the King’s private residence, which houses a collection of Cambodian artwork from artists around the world; and his office, where he actively pursues Royal duties. The architecturally incongruous Napoleon III Pavilion—shipped and reassembled in Cambodia—was a gift of the French Empress Eugenie in the early 20th century. Outside the southeast wall of the palace is

the House of the White Elephant, traditionally used for special regal occasions including royal births, deaths or weddings. Continue your **walk** to the **Silver Palace**, located within the Royal Palace compound. Its floor is made up of 5,000 silver tiles. On display inside are hundreds of gifts received by the Royal family over the years. Among the exhibits are solid gold Buddha encrusted with 9,584 diamonds and weighing almost 200 lbs, and a small 17th-century emerald and baccarat crystal Buddha. The compound also houses the **Wat Phnom Mondap temple**, containing Buddha’s footprint. The walls surrounding the compound—the oldest part of the palace—are covered with frescoes depicting episodes from the Khmer version of Ramayana, the Reamker. You will return to Sihanoukville and the ship in the late evening.

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Day 1 (L/D)

Transfer from Sihanoukville to **Phnom Penh**, Cambodia's capital. **Lunch** will be served at a local hotel in Phnom Penh before transferring to the airport for a **flight to Siem Reap**. Upon arrival at Siem Reap, check in at your hotel. Enjoy **dinner** and a **cultural show** at a local restaurant this evening.

Day 2 (B/L/D)

After **breakfast** at the hotel, you'll visit the monumental **Angkor Thom**—the last capital of the Khmers—with its Elephant Terrace, the Terrace of the Leper King and the stunning Bayon Temple. This 12th-century masterpiece lies at the center of Angkor Thom and is a wonder of symmetry and grandeur. The exterior gallery walls have extensive bas reliefs, but the highlight is the 'faces'—more than 200 of them, with the famous half-smile playing on their lips. PJ de Beerski wrote of them, "godliness in the majesty and the size, mystery in the expression." Continue your exploration of the Angkor temples at **Ta Prohm**. This temple has been left largely in its natural state since its 're-discovery' by French explorers. Surrounded by jungle, its labyrinth of stone hallways is overgrown with the roots and limbs of massive banyan trees that envelop it like tentacles. It is one of the largest temples at Angkor, dedicated in 1186. Historians have noted its mystical charm. Entering the courtyards is like stepping into a new kind of vegetable world—not of branches and leaves, but of roots. Ta Prohm is an exhibition of the mysterious subterranean life of plants, offering an infinite variety of cross sections. "Huge trees have seeded themselves on the roofs of the squat towers and their soaring trunks are obscured from sight, but here one can study in comfort the drama of those secret and conspiratorial activities that labor to support their titanic growth," said Norman Lewis in *A Dragon Apparent*. Return to your hotel for **lunch** and check out; then, this afternoon you'll enjoy a Remok (Tuk Tuk) tour of **Angkor Wat**. This the largest temple in the world, with a volume of stone equaling that of the Cheops pyramid in Egypt. It is unlike all other Khmer temples in that it faces west, and is inspired by 12th-century Hinduism. Its symmetrical towers are stylized on the modern Cambodian flag. Conceived by Suryavarman II, Angkor Wat took an estimated 30 years to build. It is generally believed to have been a funeral temple for the king. It has been occupied continuously by Buddhist monks and is well preserved. Intricate bas reliefs surround Angkor Wat on four sides. Each tells a story. The most celebrated of these is the Churning of the Ocean of Milk, which is located on the east wing. In it, the Naga serpent is twisted by demons and gods to spurt out the elixir of life. Return to Siem Reap for an early **dinner** at a local restaurant. Then transfer to the airport for your flight to **Ho Chi Minh City**. Check into your hotel and overnight.

Day 3 (B/L)

After breakfast you will be introduced to the major highlights of bustling **Ho Chi Minh City**, still commonly referred to as Saigon. Keep your eyes open for colorful street scenes such as markets

selling everything from chilies to French baguettes and, of course, an endless stream of bicycles, cyclos and motorbikes. A **photo stop** is included at the Notre Dame Cathedral—a neo-Classical structure dating back to the 19th century. Then continue to the former **Presidential Palace**, now known as Unification Hall. This historic building was made famous when a North Vietnamese tank crashed through its front gates in 1975, signaling the end of the Vietnam War. It has changed little since that time and is now retained as a museum. Your tour will include the reception and dining rooms of the President's quarters, and the basement with its ancient American-made telecommunications equipment still in place, and strategic military maps lining the walls. A short drive from there brings you to the **History Museum**. Built in 1929, this museum houses an excellent collection of artifacts illustrating the evolution of the cultures of Vietnam, from bronze-aged Dong Son civilization to Cham, Khmer and modern day Vietnam. Enjoy **lunch** at a local restaurant before driving from Saigon to **Phu My** port to re-join the ship.

Notes:

Modest attire is required for visiting temples; no fitted or collarless tops are allowed; shirts/blouses must cover shoulders; trousers must cover ankles; shorts and skirts are not permitted. A wrap is not sufficient. Wear closed-toe shoes; no sandals or backless shoes. Men must wear socks. Travel time from Sihanoukville to Phnom Penh is approximately four hours. Travel time from Saigon to Phu My port is approximately two hours. The Apsara Authority will not allow children under the age of 12 years to climb up to the top level of Angkor Wat. Due to this tour's popularity, exclusivity, and strict booking conditions, tour bookings must be confirmed 60 days prior to the actual call to Sihanoukville with no cancellations allowed thereafter. **Important:** It is each guest's sole responsibility to obtain (before traveling) any visas, vaccinations and/or tourist cards that are required for participating in overland adventures or overnight tours, unless noted otherwise in the description. Please be aware that you may need a visa for any and/or all countries that you will depart from and travel through as part of your overland adventure or overnight tour, and for the country in which you will re-join the ship.

Transfer to the airport for a **flight to Siem Reap**. Upon arrival at Siem Reap, check in at your **hotel** and enjoy **dinner** and a **cultural show** at local restaurant.

Day 2 (B/L/D)

After **breakfast** at the hotel this morning, hop aboard a **tuk tuk** for a fun ride to the monumental **Angkor Thom**—the last capital of the Khmers. With its Elephant Terrace, the Terrace of the Leper King, the stunning **Bayon Temple**, a 12th-century masterpiece, lies at the center of Angkor Thom and is a wonder of symmetry and grandeur. 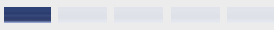

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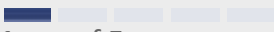

A scenic two-hour drive through the Cambodian countryside brings you to **Kampot**, with rice paddies, traditional stilt-houses and rural life evident all along the way. You'll stop at a **pepper plantation** that produces the famous Kampot pepper—renowned for decades as one of the best peppers in the world. You will also stop at a local village to witness the daily life of the farmers and learn about making a living in the countryside. Continue to **Kampot** town, with a population of about 40,000 inhabitants, to view its beautiful French colonial architecture. Enjoy a fresh **seafood lunch** at a local restaurant here. The area is known for its fresh and delicious crab—straight from the ocean to your plate. On the way back to Sihanoukville, you'll spend a few minutes at **Ropang Ropov fishing village** to see locals bringing in the catch, mending nets, or relaxing after the day's work.

Transfer to Ochheuteal Beach (Sold On Board)

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Board a motor coach and relax as your driver takes you through **Sihanoukville** for a panoramic overview of the town. Then, you're headed to one of the area's prettiest beaches at **Ochheuteal**—a long sweep of snow-white sand facing the typically-calm waters of the Gulf of Thailand. Break here for a short **stroll along the beach** and some time at leisure, under the shade of the pine trees, before you return to the ship.
