Geraldton, Australia

The capital of the Batavia Coast was founded in 1850 as a commercial port serving the Northampton lead mine some 30 miles to the north. While Geraldton remains one of Western Australia's major ports, the city has become a magnet for vacationing Australians. Located between the Chapman and Greenough Rivers, Geraldton boasts a superb Mediterranean climate, scenic beauty and pristine beaches. Coronation Beach has become an international destination for windsurfers.

In 1692 the Dutch East India Company Batavia was shipwrecked on the offshore Abrolhos Islands. Calamity was followed by mutiny and murder. The lurid tale ensured this portion of Western Australia would be named the Batavia Coast.

Note: Geraldton is an anchorage port. Passengers transfer to shore via ship's tender.

Points of Interest

🚺 St Francis Xavier Cathedral

This ornate cathedral was designed by Monsignor John Cyril Hawes in 1915, and took 23 years to complete. The Cathedral reflects the Inter War Romanesque period and style of architecture, and is built of local Geraldton stone.

🗿 Western Australian Museum

Perched on the edge of the Indian Ocean, the Western Australian Museum sits overlooking the new Geraldton Marina. This modern museum celebrates the rich heritage of the people of Western Australia.

Lobster Factory

Learn about the Western Rock Lobster industry and why the clear Batavia waters are a haven for this seafood delicacy. (Seasonal and operating only from mid-November to mid-Julv).

HMAS Sydney Memorial

In November 1941, HMAS Sydney sank with the loss of all hands during an engagement with the German raider Kormoran.

Oakabella Homestead

The Oakabella Homestead was founded in 1860. Tour the restored 13-room main house, cookhouse, stables, shearing shed and blacksmith shop. See a mid-19th Century bottle display and learn about antique farm machinery.

🜀 Kalbarri National Park

Located on Western Australia's mid north coast, Kalbarri National Park is known for its spectacular scenery and red rock gorges that were cut from the landscape by the mighty Murchison River.

🕜 Greenough

The area was first explored by George Grey in 1839 after which he named the area after Sir George Bellas Greenough. Grey claimed that the area could become the granary of Western Australia.
